Kakivak Association serves Inuit
in the thirteen communities that
make up the Qikiqtani Region
of Nunavut. Our region is large,
stretching 2,200 kilometres from
Sanikiluaq in south-east Hudson
Bay to Grise Fiord on Ellesmere
Island. Our communities are
diverse, ranging from Iqaluit,
the territorial capital with
a population over 8,000, to
Grise Fiord in the high Arctic
with a population of 150.

We continue to see tremendous success for Inuit in post-secondary education, and we see the pressure on the programs and services required to keep up with the demand. To enhance our support for Inuit post-secondary students we partnered with Inuuqatigiit Centre for Inuit Children, Youth and Families to provide tutoring, counselling and other services for Inuit students in Ottawa.

While there are still some lingering impacts from the Covid-19 pandemic, entrepreneurs are moving forward with business development projects. We are working to enhance our capacity to deliver business development services in Inuktitut, and we have started to deliver a training course to help Inuit-owned businesses learn to do business with government.

I would like to thank the Board of Directors, Management and Staff for all their hard work over the past year. They are truly committed to helping Inuit succeed. A special thank you to Peter Tumilty, who held the position of President & CEO from late September 2021 to January 2023. I appreciate his leadership and support during a time of organizational change.

CANADIAN NORTHERN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AGENCY

In 2022-23 the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency established a new stream of economic development funding under the Northern Indigenous Economic Opportunities Program. Under this new program stream Kakivak will receive \$1,670,000 annually to contribute to economic development based on community and organizational needs. Kakivak will utilize this funding based on the following:

- 1. Support training of community members in various sectors of Nunavut's economy
- 2. Support community economic development initiatives
- 3. Enhance organizational capacity for the delivery of Kakivak's community economic development programs and services
- 4. Enhance organizational capacity for the promotion and communication of Kakivak's community economic development programs and services
- 5. Maximize the potential deployment and/ or utilization of all Kakivak programs for the benefit of Inuit clients and communities

BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

Kakivak's Business Development Officers can help with business planning and to determine the best options available to finance a business startup or expansion. We offer a number of programs and services to help your business succeed.

SMALL TOOLS GRANTS

Small Tools Grants is our most popular program. These grants can be used to assist with the purchase of carving tools or sewing machines.

SIVUMMUT GRANTS TO SMALL BUSINESS

Sivummut Grants can be used to support the establishment or expansion of viable Inuit-owned businesses.

ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES FUND

The Economic Opportunities Fund can provide grants of up to \$10,000 for the startup or expansion of tourismbased businesses in the 6 communities adjacent to the National Parks in the Qikiqtani Region.

MAKIGIAQVIK LOANS

The Makigiaqvik Loans
Program can provide loans
of up to \$50,000 for eligible
Inuit-owned businesses.
These loans can be used to
start-up or expand a business.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

This program provides contributions to support the startup and expansion of eligible Inuit-owned businesses. Kakivak delivers this program through an agreement with the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency.

BUSINESS CAPACITY AND STARTUP FUND

The Business Capacity and Startup Fund is available to assist new and existing businesses, with priority for businesses operating in the communities included in the Mary River Inuit Impact Benefits Agreement. Kakivak delivers this program through an agreement with the Qikiqtani Inuit Association.



ONE MAN SHOW!

Pangnirtung business owner-operator Sakiasie Sowdlooapik operates Sak's Amiaq & Rental, specializing in house painting, minor repairs and vehicle rentals. Sakiasie has two vehicles for rental and employs two part-time seasonal employees.

In 2022-23 Sak's Amiaq & Rental received financial support through Kakivak's Sivummut Grant Program.

WORDS OF THANKS

I am writing to express our appreciation from Huit Huit Tours Ltd. for the financial support we received during and after Covid.

Covid was an interruption to the hotel and tour business that is our main income. We are deemed an essential service, but with very few travellers our sales were not covering our expenses. Kakivak made the application process and reporting requirements for Covid Relief Funding very simple and straightforward to access. Especially for the first year of Covid travel restrictions in Nunavut it was so important

for our business to receive this financial support for us to continue to operate successfully into the post-Covid period.

During the Covid Travel restrictions we kept our dining room fully operational, and expanded our sales to offer delivery. Keeping the dining room operating helped us retain local staff.

This year we applied for funding through the Sivummut Program and CanNor's Entrepreneurship and Business Development funding that Kakivak administers. We received

funding to assist with our internet upgrade to be able to provide unlimited internet to our guests at the hotel, and provide security camera systems at our three hotels and two guest houses to help prevent vandalism in our community.

Thank you for your ongoing support for a locally Inuit-owned business that has been here since 1989 offering accommodations and tour services to visitors in Kinngait and providing jobs and training Inuit.

Kakivak Association was proud to sponsor the Arts Pavilion at the 2023 Northern Lights Conference and Trade Show, and to provide opportunities for Qikiqtani Artists to sell and promote their products. Kakivak provided \$66,000 to support 14 Qikiqtani artists, as well as venue costs. Total sales for the event were \$165,000, with \$70,000 in sales for the Qikiqtani artists. Artists were selected through an application process managed by the Baffin Regional Chamber of Commerce with support from the Newfoundland Craft Council.

SUPPORT FOR INUIT ARTISTS



For all aspiring Inuit entrepreneurs out there with a business idea, here are some of my reflections as a client of Kakivak.

I have always had a huge vision for sijjakkut, figuratively and literally where it would become a centre of excellence in Inuit culinary and accommodation that would require a new costly constructed building to house it all in.

SUPPORTING INUIT BUSINESS

To achieve my vision, I realized I needed a business plan. Back in the fall of 2018, I walked into the Kakivak offices and I was told that the process needed to be a phased approach. By phased, it meant conducting a feasibility study as a first step. If the feasibility study could prove financial projections are viable "green light, go", only then it would move onto a more costly comprehensive business plan stage.

I will be quite truthful. Back then, I was naïve and frustrated because I felt that Kakivak didn't believe in the project. Looking back, I see now that Kakivak had and has my best interest at heart. A phased approach meant my 10% equity requirement would also be phased. Meaning, I would only need to present 10% equity to the more costly business plan only if the feasibility study was a "green light, go". My hard-earned money was safeguarded from contributing 10% to a costly business plan unnecessarily. After some delays moving forward on the project, we were assigned Paul Compton as our Kakivak lead. Paul has been nothing short of an amazing help. He brought me from being a naïve entrepreneur with a dream to an entrepreneur who understands the fundamentals it takes to accomplish a completed business plan process.

My story is a long 5 years in the making. My tenacity and perseverance coupled with Paul's expertise advisement and the competency of the consultant has made for one huge successful process. Sijjakkut now has a comprehensive business plan and is able to seek financial support from investors, banks, and lenders. Moreover, I might add, the financial projections demonstrate that sijjakkut will be debt free of the 5-milliondollar construction of a 4800 square foot venture after year 5 operation. Incredible, right?

SUPPORTING BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT

In November 2022 Kakivak rolled out the delivery of a new training course on government procurement, Introduction to Government Procurement for Inuit Businesses in Nunavut. This course was developed by Kakivak with the support of a team of subject matter experts. The goal of the project is to help Inuit-owned businesses prepare for bidding on federal and territorial government contracts.


SUPPORTING INUIT IN BUSINESS

Planning processes for business development can be challenging and time consuming, but Kakivak is here to help. Kakivak's Business Development Officers can provide guidance and support to new entrepreneurs who are trying to start a business, or assist more experienced businesses with their expansion projects. Kakivak can also provide services and funding to match clients with business consultants and subject-matter experts to assist with business plans, feasibility studies, business valuations and more.

CHILDCARE, YOUTH AND DISABILITY

The Childcare, Youth & Disability Department at Kakivak Association offers a number of programs specifically targeted to these groups. Together with our partners, we are able to deliver seven key programs.

- The Career Promotion and Awareness Program provides support for the provision of career development information and awareness through projects such as career fairs.
- The Mentored Work,
 Information and
 Communications
 Technology Work
 Placements Program
 supports youth mentored
 work experiences, career
 planning and counselling
 activities. It also supports life
 and work experience and
 skills development to youth.
- The Science and
 Technology Program
 supports activities that
 promote science and
 technology as an education
 and career choice, including
 science camps, computer
 clubs, and activities that
 connect science and
 technology to traditional
 aboriginal knowledge.

- offers support for basic operations and maintenance, attendance-based operations and maintenance, support for culture and language instruction, operational equipment and worker training.
- The Baffin Inuit Youth Employment Program encourages employers to hire youth they would not normally hire by providing funding for wage subsidies.
- Program encourages
 employers to hire individuals
 with disabilities by providing
 funding for wage subsidies,
 assistance for training,
 or special equipment.
- The Summer Work
 Experience Program
 provides employer
 subsidies for summer work
 experience opportunities
 for Inuit students
 attending secondary or

NUNAVUT SIVUNIKSAVUT

Nunavut Sivuniksavut is a unique post-secondary program designed to empower Inuit youth. Through a demanding academic and experiential education program students embark on a life-changing journey of self-discovery and personal development.

Kakivak provides funding to Nunavut Sivuniksavut each year. In 2022-23 Kakivak provided \$293,690 to support 29 Qikiqtani students.

YOUTH OUTREACH







Members of the Kakivak Team attended the High School Career Fair in Iqaluit in December, 2022. This was a great opportunity to connect with high school students to let them know about Kakivak's education, training and youth-focused programs.



NORTHERN YOUTH ABROAD

The Canadian Program is Northern Youth Abroad's first and largest offering. The program is highlighted by a six week placement in one of the 10 southern provinces. Participants are paired and stay with a host family while completing a volunteer work placement that aligns with their career interests. Participants earn up to 9 high school credits for their efforts while building a variety of skills in a supported environment. The program helps youth have a clearer sense of their identity and of their own interests, skills, and career objectives.




PANGNIRTUNG SPRING CAMP PROGRAM

The purpose of the Spring Camp Program is to provide a land camp experience, grounded in Inuit ways and worldview, in a supportive atmosphere for the students to learn land skills, food and skin preparation, and other skills they may require. There are over 200 student participants and 50 adult volunteers involved each year.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE



Kakivak's model child care facility project was designed with input from experienced childcare managers, daycare society board members, the Qikiqtani Inuit Association, Nunavut Tunngavik Inc. and the Government of Nunavut Department of Education.

INVESTMENTS IN PLANNING FOR NEW AND RENOVATED CENTRES

In anticipation of receiving new federal funding for capital projects Kakivak Association has taken on a number of preliminary planning initiatives to support the renovation of existing child care facilities and planning for new construction. These projects have included professional inspections and renovation plans, and the development of architectural and engineering plans for a model child care facility.

As the result of some preliminary planning already completed, Kakivak was able to assist child care centres in Pond Inlet, Pangnirtung and Kimmirut to access a total of \$2.8 million to fund their renovation projects. The Naurainnuk Daycare in Pond Inlet (left) and the Kimmirut Pairivik (below) are two of the centres that will benefit from major renovations to be carried out in 2024 or 2025.

- The **Wage Subsidy Program** assists employers hiring Inuit by providing wage subsidies.
- **Employment Related Training** provides funding for wage subsidies to support job mentoring and training on the job initiatives.

PARTNERING FOR SUCCESS

HIGH ARCTIC TRADES TRAINING

Kakivak Association committed over \$3 million over three years to support the High Arctic Trades Training initiative, a project undertaken by NCC Developments with support from the Qikiqtani Inuit Association, Qikiqtani Industries Ltd., Makigiaqta and the Qikiqtaaluk Business Development Corporation. The program provides 12 weeks of classroom and handson training, and then a work placement on a construction project. The project started in 2022, with the first group in Resolute Bay.

DRIVER TRAINING




Kakivak Association and the Qikiqtani Inuit Association partnered to establish a Driver Training program, developed and delivered by Arctic Training LTD. The goal is to support Inuit in the communities to obtain a Class 5 Driver's License, with the potential to also obtain a Class 3 License. The project will run for 5 years, and is supported with funding provided through the Government of Canada's Strategic Partnership Fund.



INUIT POST SECONDARY EDUCATION

Kakivak Association has a funding arrangement with Nunavut Tunngavik Incorporated to deliver the Inuit Post Secondary Education Program. Initially rolled-out in 2020, this program provides financial support and wrap-around services for Inuit post-secondary students, regardless of where they reside in Canada. The funding originates with Indigenous Services Canada with national coordination provided by Inuit Tapariit Kanatami.

SUPPORTING STUDENTS



230 CLIENTS ASSISTED FOR JOB SEARCH AND RESUME WRITING

When the Covid-19 Pandemic was declared in March 2020, Kakivak Association followed the direction of the Chief Public Health Officer for Nunavut and closed our office to the public, which included the closure of the Career Services Centre. During this time some services were provided through phone calls and emails, primarily to update and print client resumes. The closure of the Centre continued until Covid-19 related public health orders were lifted, and was re-opened in June 2022.

In 2023-24 Kakivak is planning to update the Centre, and transition to the use of Tuttarvik for resume writing and job search. Tuttarvik is an online labour pool database, created by the Qikiqtani Inuit Association to connect Inuit to jobs, careers and training updates.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH

The end to the travel restrictions caused by the Covid-19 Pandemic allowed for some overdue travel to the communities. In December 2022, Kakivak visited Pond Inlet, and then Resolute Bay in May 2023.



FINANCIAL SUMMARY


Program Spending & Operating Costs 2022-2023

Kakivak Association delivers a range of programs that support education and training, childcare, youth initiatives, business development and career services. Over the past 10 years Kakivak's program spending has totalled over \$84.3 million dollars, an average of \$8.4 million per year. In the past two years the average program spending has increased to over \$15 million per year. The increase is due to a combination of high demand for Kakivak programs and enhanced funding agreements with Canada.

Program Delivery Results







SOURCES OF REVENUE 2022-2023



Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC)

Kakivak Association has an ongoing partnership with ESDC for delivery of programs and services under the Indigenous Skills and Employment Training Strategy (ISETS). Through this agreement Kakivak provides funding and services related to education, training, career development and childcare programs. The total funding in 2022-23 was \$13,846,868.

Nunavut Tunngavik Incorporated (NTI)

Kakivak Association has a funding relationship with NTI to support the delivery of the Inuit Post Secondary Education Program. This program provides financial support and wrap-around services for Inuit post-secondary students, regardless of where they reside in Canada. The funding originates with Indigenous Services Canada with national coordination provided by Inuit Tapariit Kanatami. The total funding in 2022-23 was \$2,821,105.

Indigenous Services Canada (ISC)

Kakivak Association has an ongoing partnership with ISC for the delivery of Youth Employment Strategy programs. Through this partnership Kakivak provides project funding through five youth employment and career awareness programs. Kakivak Association also has an agreement with Indigenous Services Canada to support business capacity development related to government procurement. The total funding in 2022-23 was \$2,242,724.

Qikiqtani Inuit Association (QIA)

Kakivak Association is the non-profit economic development arm of the QIA which contributes funding to support the delivery of business and community economic development programs and services, and a childcare subsidy. The total funding for 2022-23 was \$1,508,070.

Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency (CanNor)

Kakivak Association has an ongoing partnership with the CanNor for the delivery of business development programs and services. In 2022-23 Kakivak established an additional agreement under the Northern Indigenous Economic Opportunities Program to support a range of community economic development initiatives. The total funding in 2022-23 was \$1,452,966.

Other

Other revenue is derived from interest earned, unrealized gains or losses on investments and other sources. The majority of this revenue is dependent on the performance of a low-risk investment portfolio and is difficult to predict from year to year. The total other revenue for 2022-23 was \$503,205.
